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THE ECONOMICS OF HEAVEN



LLOYD SHADRACH

"There is one who scatters, and yet increases all the more, And there is one who withholds what is justly due, and yet it results only in want.

PROVERBS 11:24

I have always been struck by the paradox of these verses.

- How is it that the person who "scatters" giving away what she possesses ends up with more?!
- How can the person who holds on to what should justly be given, end up wanting!?

The outcomes don't correspond with the behavior. You don't get more, when you give what you have. And you should not have want, when you keep what should be given. This makes no sense! Could it be that Solomon, the wisest man who ever lived, is giving us an example of heavenly economics, where what makes no sense from a worldly viewpoint, makes all the sense in the world when seen from heaven? I think so. And his economics are built upon three biblical principles.

First, God owns everything. Consider Psalm 89:11...

¹¹The heavens are yours, and the earth is yours; everything in the world is yours—you created it all.

If you create something, you own it. There is nothing in the universe that God did not create. Nothing. Therefore, he owns everything.

The second principle flows directly from the first: If God owns everything, then I own nothing.

Let me clarify. From an earthly perspective, you own what you work for, what you purchase. But from a biblical perspective your car, your clothes, your shoes, your watch, your home, your checking, savings and retirement accounts, even your pet are not yours, they are God's. (First principle: God owns everything)

God has gladly given you all you have (it's in His DNA). But, He gives us all we have to enjoy as



stewards. A steward is not an owner, but one who has been entrusted by the owner to manage and allocate their resources.

The third principle: God's resources are unlimited. If you possessed every piece of currency on the planet, while it would be a gargantuan amount, it would be finite. But for the one who creates all things from nothing, there is no limit to what He possesses.

Taken together, these three biblical truths explain Solomons paradox of the heavenly economy.

Solomon is describing the person who is living these three principles. Thus, when this person gives what she possesses away, she is not diminished in the least. Just the opposite, she experiences increase. But how?

As God's steward, she has access to an infinite amount of all that is needed. Her giving is not a deduction from a limited amount. It is a distribution of limitless supply.

Think of it like this: Suppose you were given just one bucket of water to water your crop for the entire growing season. You would probably apply that water in "drips" and "drops", seeking to make it last as long as possible.

But suppose you had a hose hooked to a spigot that tapped into an underground artesian well. You would let the water flow like a river, and, your crops would multiply. A bucket holds water. A hose distributes water. This is what Solomon implies when he adds the parallel statement...

²⁵The generous man will be prosperous, And he who waters will himself be watered. *Proverbs* 11:25

Think back with me to our brief "mini-series" on the Kingdom of God . God's plan has always been His Kingdom: His people, in His place, under His rule, enjoying His blessings, forever. Those "in the kingdom" live to bring others who are across the street or across the sea "into" the Kingdom.

God supplies all the funds and resources required for that mission by entrusting His unlimited supply to citizens of the Kingdom, who steward those resources for the expansion of His kingdom on earth.

Giving and being a blessing to the world are part of God's nature. Made in His image, it is our DNA as well. That's why our giving to extend God's kingdom in this world does not "diminish" us in any way. Rather, stewarding His resources for His Kingdom, our "less" is always "more." Such is the way of heavenly economics.

WHAT IS GLOBAL CHRISTMAS?

E very December, it is our privilege at Fellowship Bible Church to take a few weeks and place special emphasis on what God is doing around the world, both locally and globally. We call this season Global Christmas. It is a reminder for us to look beyond ourselves and embrace the work our Global and Local partners are doing as they embrace hurting people who need the good news of Jesus Christ.

There are many needs that we could come alongside but our commitment to building relationships causes us to be intentional with a few. We have strategically selected local and global partnerships to help invest in and further their mission. Our partnerships are intentionally selected so our members have the opportunity to serve regularly and build relationships that shape us. Without intentionally building relationships with others on our street, community, and around the world we will remain limited in our understanding, experience, and views of who God is and the needs of the world. This commitment is rooted in our values of Better Together and Not About Ourselves.

Your giving makes a difference! These partners are doing incredible things, and we get the chance to come alongside and join them in kingdom work. Because of the generosity of your prayers, finances and sending global teams, we have helped to train leaders, educate and feed children, grow churches and so much more. And it is my prayer that your love may abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment, so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.

We asked six of our global partners to share what God has been up to in their communities, and how He's using even a global pandemic for His glory.

KRŠCANŠKA BAPTISTIČKA CRKV



STEFFEN IN GERMANY:

Despite limitations on where we could gather, our church experienced meaningful outdoor baptisms and child dedications which were witnessed by those passing by. In addition, our families have spent more time together in Bible study and devotions. We have felt less fear and more joy!

DR. IMAD IN JORDAN:

2020 was an unusual year, in that most operations and classes were held online. Even though the economy was down, and new students weren't allowed to enter Jordan, we were grateful for an increase in our online enrollment. The Lord has also provided financially according to His riches, despite the fact that most companies have closed down or are paying half their salaries.



DARKO IN CROATIA:

In this season of Covid-19, God opened an unexpected door of opportunity: a city-wide festival. Due to indoor restrictions, we performed live music at our city's main square. We also streamed our message online each evening. These adjustments allowed us to reach thousands of people rather than hundreds. Our way was small; His way was more than we could have imagined!



ANGEL IN PERU:

In a country that has endured many COVID-related deaths, God has used us to encourage, heal and comfort the afflicted. We have seen God bring families together, and many have learned to serve others by living out the parable of the Good Samaritan. God's miracles have been evident this year; we praise Him and declare Jesus as the only Lord and Savior, the only solution for our lives.





ANDREJ IN SLOVENIA:

When COVID put an end to large group meetings, our church gathered in small groups to pray for all of Slovenia and for specific towns in each region. Our small group spent four eight-hour days prayer-walking in a particular town in our area. At one point we climbed the surrounding hills and prayed for the city as a whole. Through this prayer walk, we met several people that had never before heard the gospel, and we encouraged them and gave them Bibles.

DINISLAM IN RUSSIA:

We have wanted to minister to children in our area by providing temporary housing for orphans. The pandemic caused delays in getting proper documents, however, so the house remained empty and the ministry was put on hold. Yet God had other plans. A Muslim family recently turned to Christ and was rejected by their relatives, leaving them homeless. We offered them the empty house, and now we have the vision of creating a House of Mercy for Muslims in difficult circumstances.

OPPORTUNITY FOR THE GOSPEL

"It's almost as if hardship and crisis attract us to be messengers of hope."

When Johnathan Macris, a Fellowship Global Partner and President of Hellenic Ministries in Greece, utters these words, it's fair to say they're more than idle chatter. Johnathan has lived a life full of deep challenges and daunting tasks. Yet he's quick to focus on the resulting blessings as well.

Raised in the jungles of Irian Jaya, Indonesia, as eldest son of a missionary family intent on reaching stoneaged tribes with the gospel, Johnathan learned that challenges are a part of life. His parents taught him to face each difficulty with faith, trusting that God uses trying circumstances to multiply divine blessings. Now, after years of ministry in Greece, Johnathan is more convinced than ever that God uses trials to get our attention, to increase our faith and dependence, and to spread His glory as He works on our behalf.

One fresh example comes from the Greek island of Lesvos. The aid organization EuroRelief—which Johnathan also oversees—has for several years been providing staff and volunteers to Moria refugee camp, the largest settlement of its kind in Europe. When Moria burned to the ground this past September, over twelve-thousand refugees faced a crisis within a crisis, forced to spend several nights without shelter in local fields. Worse yet, Greek villagers rioted to keep refugees from entering their city and local towns, leaving families without food, water, and basic necessities.

By the third day after the fire, the Greek army was building a new tent city near the sea, but had difficulty distributing food to the mobbing, hungry people. EuroRelief workers were asked to help, and soon devised a plan which provided all twelve-thousand refugees their first hot meal in days. (Somehow, the meal consisted of fish and Arabic bread—or, loaves and fishes—reminding the EuroRelief team of Jesus' feeding of the five thousand!).





As the tent city took shape, many of the first to return were new followers of Jesus. Now, unlike in Moria, they are meeting publicly within the camp and fellowshipping together in their tents. Each morning they study together on a low hill overlooking the sea, something they refer to as their own "sermon on the mount". They have also banded together to form a maintenance crew they call "Acts II", in order to serve their fellow refugees with the love of God. Because of the fire at Moria, a new spirit of boldness has arisen amongst God's people.

"It's amazing to see how God has used this ministry to impact refugees on Lesvos", says Johnathan. "In spite of the many challenges faced by our refugee friends as they seek a new life in Europe, many have been touched deeply by the kindness of Christian workers upon their arrival on Lesvos. Though cold, wet and hungry after rafting across the sea from Turkey, they've been met with smiling faces, warm blankets and a hot cup of tea—all in the name of Jesus. We hear story after story of how peoples' lives have been transformed by the love of God presented in this way."

Johnathan admits that challenges like the fire at Moria can leave him feeling weary and weak, especially because of the great responsibility that rests on his shoulders. "Yet, time and again," he affirms, "I've seen that during a crisis God specializes in bringing a purpose and a hope. He uses these moments to create exponential faith in the lives of those who are willing to trust Him in the midst of suffering."





ROSEMARY AND MICHELLE: A FRIENDSHIP STORY

Michelle York and Rosemary Kamati grew up a world apart, but now find mutual delight in a friendship that spans both cultures and miles.

Michelle traded the farm country of the Midwest for the music scene of Los Angeles after graduating from High School. There she met her husband, Peter, and together they moved to Nashville to begin a family. Rosemary, from a village in Western Kenya, ministered in South Sudan until war broke out in December 2013. When many Sudanese fled for their lives to refugee camps in Northern Uganda, Rosemary followed and serves there today.

Both women are proven leaders. Michelle has held a variety of leadership positions with organizations and non-profit boards; Rosemary is the Africa Director for PEACE International, overseeing a large operation of ministry staff and volunteers. She also represents PEACE at meetings with government officials.

The ladies met in 2004, when Fellowship was planning its first trip to Lietnhom, South Sudan. Rosemary visited the church and met Michelle at a women's bible study. Michelle was full of questions about her upcoming trip to Africa, and invited Rosemary for lunch and shopping. It was the beginning of a wonderful, and fruitful, friendship.

Today, Rosemary is a Fellowship Global Partner, representing the strategic work taking place in Uganda; Michelle supports the ministry by acting as Country Champion. The two have collaborated on many special projects, with Michelle traveling to Uganda five times since 2017.

When asked what drew her to this friendship, Rosemary says, "We kind of have the same heart. We are close to the same age and have many things in common. We have compassion for others, we are results-oriented, we laugh loud, and can dance and have fun when necessary. We love to develop leaders from the grassroots, and we love Jesus deeply."

Michelle agrees. "Rosemary is incredibly genuine, forthright, courageous, bright and trustworthy. She constantly strives to provide the best work possible. She may run a tight ship, but she really loves to laugh and have fun along the way!"

At the heart of their relationship is a common desire to serve the Sudanese refugees currently displaced in Uganda. They share ideas, they pray, and they strategize together. They dream about ways God might use them to bring spiritual, mental, and physical flourishing to the beautiful South Sudanese people. Michelle exclaims, "We have so much fun in this together, while absolutely marveling in awe over all that God is doing—through even us!"

When asked about their cultural differences, Rosemary admits that issues can arise. "We have laughed about some problems and warned about others," she says. "But each time we meet and talk these through, we realize how deep this friendship has grown." But there's fun differences, too. For instance, they sometimes try to copy each other's accents, with limited (and sometimes humorous) success. And, Michelle remembers when Rosemary taught her to cut Kasava plant out of the ground with a machete, then eat it. "She's a beast at it!" she laughs.

Best of all, both agree that their friendship has made them a little more fit for heaven. They see how God has used the other to prepare them for that day, because their friendship is not based on tribe, race, or color.

"God shapes us to think, feel and love outside our own cultural comforts and mindset," says Michelle," and He does the same for the people we serve. Together, we experience more deeply the breadth of the Gospel and the expanse of God's Kingdom."

Both friends are grateful that Fellowship's model is built on relationships with people, not just projects. Michelle exclaims, "We call each other 'twin' because we share the same heart for Christ and the work in Uganda. Rosemary is truly one of my dearest friends in the world; I'm grateful for the sweetness and joy she brings to my life."

Rosemary agrees. "Michelle has a love for Africa, for refugees, and for our ministry. She has been my number one cheerleader, and we love doing things for the needy, to the glory of God."



IFSM STUDENT STORY INTERVIEW

Fellowship member Mary Leichner has spent considerable time in Slovenia working with Josiah Venture and Global Partners, Andre and Nina Lovśe. She agreed to answer a few questions about her experiences, and how her life has been impacted because of her time overseas.

FELLOWSHIP: Mary, thanks for allowing us to ask you a few questions about your time in Slovenia. But first, where did you grow up, and what kind of exposure did you have to missions and to missionaries as a kid?

MARY: I grew up here in Franklin, in a Christian home where I prayed to receive Christ when I was seven years old. I knew a little about missions because my aunt and uncle were missionaries, and my older siblings went on trips with FSM.

FELLOWSHIP: Great. Tell us about your first short-term experience. When did that take place?

MARY: Well, because each of my three siblings had gone on mission trips to Slovenia, I knew there was something special about the country, and the people there. As a sophomore in High School, my family encouraged me to go, and I was terrified! Yet that trip changed my life and increased the depth of my love for the Lord. I ended up going to Slovenia three summers in a row.

FELLOWSHIP: Looking back, what impacted you most during those trips?

MARY: I was really impacted by the people I met in Slovenia, many of whom are the only believers in their school, family, or group of friends. I began to see that the cost of following the Lord in Slovenia is much greater than in the United States. God opened my eyes to my own faith. I saw my lack of devotion and trust in God. After my first trip I came back to the States with a desire to know God more.

I think that's why I ended up going back yet again, interning there for the entire summer of my Sophomore year in college.



FELLOWSHIP: As an intern what were your main ministry tasks?

MARY: So, I interned for an organization called Josiah Venture, which works alongside local churches in order to reach the youth. I helped with the weeklong "Fusion" camp, which uses music as a tool to build relationships and to share the gospel with students. The camp is SO FUN!

Most of the summer consisted of meeting one-onone with students or planning group events. My internship was unique because I'd previously built relationships in Slovenia during my short-term trips. Because of this, I was blessed with the ability to go deeper with existing relationships, while also developing new ones.

FELLOWSHIP: Mary, how have you been forever changed by your experiences in Slovenia?

MARY: First, I'd say my value for genuine relationships has grown significantly; I've experienced the beauty of relational ministry. As I get to know others on a deeper level, I can't help but talk about the Lord.

Second, my relationship with Jesus has grown. My overseas experiences revealed my need for a genuine relationship with Him. I love the Lord and I want my relationship with Him to always come first.

FELLOWSHIP: Thank you for sharing your heart with us. What would you say to those contemplating a short-term trip with Fellowship?

MARY: You may never feel "ready", but God can show His glory through anyone, no matter how inadequate they feel. Serving oversees is an awesome experience; I highly recommend it! It's a great way to challenge your faith in the Lord, to grow closer to Him, and to share who He is with others.

EVA AND THE HORSE MINISTRY

E va and her family are one of Fellowship's 12 Global partners. They serve as missionaries in Slovenia, which is located in Europe. Eva's parents are Andrej and Nina and she has 2 younger brothers, Tim and Izak.

Eva started riding horses when she was 4 years old and has loved them ever since. She has had her own horse, Charly, for 3 years. Though her family has other animals, Charly is her favorite.

Because Eva grew up hearing her parents talk about the Bible, she has always believed it to be true. She has always prayed and worshiped God. Eva says, "Lately my relationship with God has grown stronger. I have started to read the Bible on my own and pray a lot more." Eva says she's been able to see God working all around her. "I have also been more confident to tell my friends from school that I am a Christian."

Church in Slovenia looks different than our church here. Their church is a small group of people that meets in someone's home. On Sundays, all the parents study the Bible together and Eva helps teach the kids a Bible Story.

Eva is now using her talents to tell others about Jesus. She gives horseback riding lessons and hosts a Pony Camp for kids. So far, 4 of the kids from her horseback riding lessons are now attending their church, where Eva is also teaching them about God's love.

Here is Eva's message to you and kids here in America: "I really love sharing God's story with kids here in Slovenia. You can share His love, too, through something you love to do. If you can paint or draw, maybe start an art club and tell your friends about God while you're drawing. I like to find creative ways to tell kids about God's amazing work. What is a fun way you can tell someone how much God loves them?"

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germany christmas recipe KAISER-PLÄTZCHEN

Irresistible jam-filled Christmas cookies shaped like stars, hearts, or rounds. The round ones are also called Little Rogues (Spitzbuben).

INGREDIENTS

- 3 cups flour 300g
- 1 cup powdered sugar 125g
- 1 package vanilla sugar
- 1 pinch Salt
- 4 egg yolks
- 7 tablespoons butter 100g
- powdered sugar
- vanilla sugar
- raspberry or strawberry jam

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Sift flour onto work surface and make a hole in the center. Put powdered sugar, vanilla sugar, salt and egg yolks inside the hole and place the butter flakes on top of it. Quickly knead ingredients to form smooth dough. Cover with kitchen towel and let chill for 1 hour.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350° F.
- 3. Roll out dough on a floured surface as thinly as possible. Cut out cookies with cookie cutters. If using different shapes, make sure to always cut out even numbers for each shape. Use a small round cookie cutter to make a hole in the center of half the cookies. Place cookies onto a greased cookie sheet.
- 4. Bake for 15-20 minutes at 350° F in the preheated oven.
- 5. Let them cool down. Spread jam on cookies without hole and place the other half (cookie with hole) on top. Mix the powdered sugar and the vanilla sugar and dust the cookies.

VARIATION:

You may also use only round cookie cutters. The round version of these cookies is also known as Little Rogues (Spitzbuben).

PERUVIAN COOKIES PERUVIAN ALFAJORES

INGREDIENTS

For the "cookie tops":

- 100 g unsalted butter at room temperature
- 100 g granulated white sugar
- 4 egg yolks
- 2 tbsp water
- 250 g cornstarch
- 70 g flour without baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp baking powder
- powdered sugar

For the manjar blanco (caramel):

- 400 g evaporated milk
- 400 g condensed milk

INSTRUCTIONS

The "cookie" tops

- 1. Mix the butter with the sugar with a hand mixer until you have a uniform paste.
- 2. Add the yolks and water and mix.
- 3. Add the sifted dry ingredients and mix first with a spatula until you can't continue to mix it and then mix the dough with your hands. Don't knead it, just mix it because if you handle it too much it gets very hard.
- 4. Wrap in film and put in the refrigerator for 30 minutes to be able to roll it out later.
- 5. Sprinkle flour over the dough and a clean surface. Stretch until it is about 3mm thick. Move it around on the table after each stretch to make sure it isn't sticking.
- 6. Cut the cookies in circles and put them on a baking tray lined with parchment paper.
- 7. Place in a preheated oven at 180C for 8min.
- 8. Allow to cool completely before filling.



The Manjar Blanco (Caramel)

- 1. Put the milk in a large pot and keep stirring with a spatula over medium-low heat until you can see the bottom of the pot clearly.
- 2. Transfer to a container that can withstand moving from hot to cold. The bigger container the better as this cools it down faster.
- 3. Fill the cookie tops with the caramel using a sleeve.
- 4. Sprinkle the cookies with powdered sugar.
